Illustrator



Story Themes

Grandparents: A touching story that explores the special relationships between chlildren and grandparents.

Perseverance: Everyone, except Evie seems to be catching fish. Evie doesn't give up, until she catches something even better than a fish.

Nature: The story explores through its words and illustrations many sea side creatures. It also has a subtle message about sustainability.



Before Reading

- Show the cover of the book and read the title. Then ask the following questions:
 - O What do you think the story will be about?
 - O Whose hand do you think the girl may be holding?
- Read the blurb. Then ask the following questions:
 - O Whose hand do you think the girl is holding now?
 - O What do you think will happen in this story?
 - o Have you ever been fishing before? What was it like for you?

During Reading

Read the story the first time without interupting or stopping, other than for making predictions. During the second read, stop at examples of alliteration and assonance. Explain that these are poetic techniques used by authors to make their writing more emotive, memorable and enjoyable to read out loud. Say some of the phrases together. Describe how it feels when you say phrases that use alliteration and assonance.

After Reading

- What was the story about?
- How did Evie feel at the beginning of the story? Optimistic, hopeful, happy
- How do you know this? Evie is hurrying grandpa along. She says, 'A big fish is waiting for me.' The illustrations show her jumping ahead and leading Grandpa.
- How did Evie feel in the middle of the story? *She is becoming frustrated, annoyed and disheartened.*
- How do you know this? Evie kicks over her bucket. She asks, 'Why do fish hide from me?' The illustrations show raindrops, or tears, dripping down her face.
- Why do you think she lets the octopus go, instead of eating it for dinner?
- Why do you think Grandpa tells Evie silly stories? Which one of his silly stories do you like best?
- Discuss family and loved ones (mum, dad, siblings, grandparents) and the activities that you like to do with them. Highlight that sometimes it's not about simply doing the activity with our loved ones, but the good times we have with them. Even though Evie wanted to catch a fish with Grandpa, Grandpa made sure that the time they spent together was fun by telling her silly stories.

- Repeat the activity independently or as a group for dashing (page 10), scuttle (page 4) and squabble (page 19).

Kindergarten / Prep - Year 3

Toilet Roll Octopus - BLM4

• Follow the instructions to make your own toilet roll octopus.



You will need:

A toilet roll
Paint and paint brushes
Scissors

3. Spot stickers 7. A black marker

4. Googly eyes

What to do:

Step 1: Paint your toilet roll and leave it to dry.

Step 2: Draw 8 lines from the base of the toilet roll to the middle.

Step 4: Cut along the 8 lines and turn them out to create the legs.

Step 5: Place spotty stickers along the legs to create suckers.

Step 6: Stick on the googly eyes.

Step 7: Draw a mouth for your octopus.
